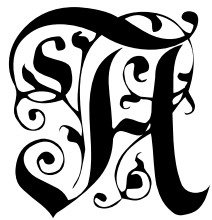

group of us from St. Francis visited the Billy Graham

Library recently. What an incredible experience it was for all of us. Dr. Graham is certainly someone from whom we can pattern our lives. I will never forget seeing him (with the other thousands of people) in the Orange Bowl in Miami when I was about 11 years old. In a Billy Graham newspaper column, someone wrote:

"I'm in my 80s and all alone, and I know it's my own fault. I went through life being disagreeable and demanding that everybody do things my way, and all my relatives turned against me. Maybe someone will learn from my life. I wish I could live it over."

One of our greatest fears is reaching old age and looking back with only regrets. Rev. Graham was compassionate in his answer, but he was also truthful. He wrote, "One of life's hardest lessons is that we cannot change the past." He went on with encouraging words of

trusting in God with any change. You cannot change the past but you can certainly change the present which influences the future. You can live life more abundantly no matter what your age. No matter what your age, you can begin again. No one knew that better than the Apostle Paul. He had so many regrets but he knew of the indisputable power of Christ to change a person from the inside out.

We are made alive with Christ. God gives us a new life. And with that new life, there is a new beginning. We are to dedicate our lives to be as Christ-like as possible. Our lives are to be a life-long gift to others. We give of our time, treasure and talents because it is the concrete way to say that we are alive in Christ. And we rejoice in the giving.

How shall we start our new year of Christian Education, our new year of going back to school, our new year of being together in worship? How can we make our life one life-long gift to others?

1. By seeing. See Christ in each and every person you meet. Remember it is the 'Christ in you that sees the Christ in me.'
2. By knowing. Know in your heart the love of God will be with you no matter what life throws your way.
3. By being. Being alive with Christ is awaking each and every

day with the joy of Christ in your heart.

Let us all start anew together on September 7th beginning with our Mass on the Grass at the Kiwanis Park at 10am. It is a great time for all of us from both services to come together in fellowship and worship. If Hurricane Hanna brings much needed rain, we will meet in the Parish House.

And then let's all come together for the great Sunday School and Adult Ed classes beginning September 14th at 9:30. Our new worship service time will be at 10:30. We will continue to have 8am services.

We can all begin anew when we wake up tomorrow morning by greeting the day with Christ in our hearts and truly saying; "This is the day the Lord hath made ... Let us rejoice and be glad in it!" Let us begin again with Christ.

I would ask you – Have you seen Jesus? I have seen Jesus at St. Francis.

I have seen Jesus in the person who put some food in the Yokefellow basket on Sunday morning. I have seen Jesus in the person who assisted someone to communion. I have seen Jesus in the person who encouraged a young person to take part in the life of the church. I have seen Jesus in the soup eater, who saved their Campbell's soup labels and left them in the Narthex to assist Thompson's. I have seen Jesus in the person who dropped off the pull tabs from sodas and other cans in the Narthex to assist children through the efforts of the Shriners. I have seen Jesus in the person who bought a Relay For Life luminary in order to remember someone who has been challenged by cancer. I have seen Jesus in the person who prepared and served Punch after church during the summer.

Stewardship is perceived as only being about money. However, stewardship is much more than that. Stewardship is not about the big financial gifts that are given to the church, although they are always welcome. Stewardship is about caring for each other in the many little things that we do. It is about saving pull tabs from pop-top cans. It is about bringing food for Yokefellow. It is about the fellowship of potluck, and washing the dishes afterwards. It is about teaching Sunday School and reading the lessons during worship. It is about reaching out to people who are new to St. Francis and demonstrating to them how much of a loving family we are. It is about being identifiably available to assist someone, new to the church or not, that needs assistance before or during worship. Stewardship is about the small things that we do that show we love Jesus enough to reach out to each other.

2008 NATIONAL JUNIOR DIRECTRESS RETREAT

Forty women from around the country, as far west as Texas and Colorado and as far north as Massachusetts, came to Camp St. Christopher in South Carolina in August for a retreat. Five of these women are on the National Council, but are also Junior Directresses. The purpose was three-fold – to spend some time nourishing our souls, to plan for Triennial and to review and revise the documents of the Junior Daughters. We spent two very intense days working on these projects and still managed to find time to indeed nourish our souls and to relax in the comfortable space of our sister Directresses. During this time we prepared the Agenda for the Junior portion of Triennial and planned all the activities for that time, including a few to be done before had that will involve all junior daughters, those who will be able to go to Triennial and also those that will not. We also converted the Junior bylaws into policies, as the Daughters of the King already have bylaws that the Juniors are governed by, but we still need policies specifically for Juniors and revised those policies. We reviewed the Junior Handbook, as this has not been revised in over ten years. We have made significant changes to the handbook which we are submitting to the National Council this fall. Our goal is to have the new handbooks printed and ready to be handed out at Triennial. It was a pleasure to be able to go to this retreat both representing Catherine Junior Chapter of St. Francis and the Diocese of Western North Carolina. The following encapsulates the feeling of the weekend:

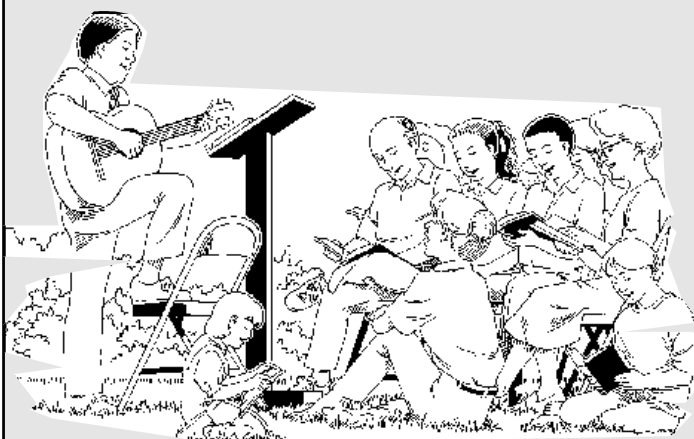

- A hanging picture frame that holds an 8¹/₂" x 11" photo (optional)

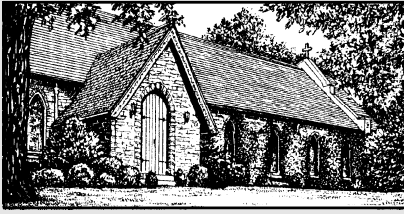
What you do:

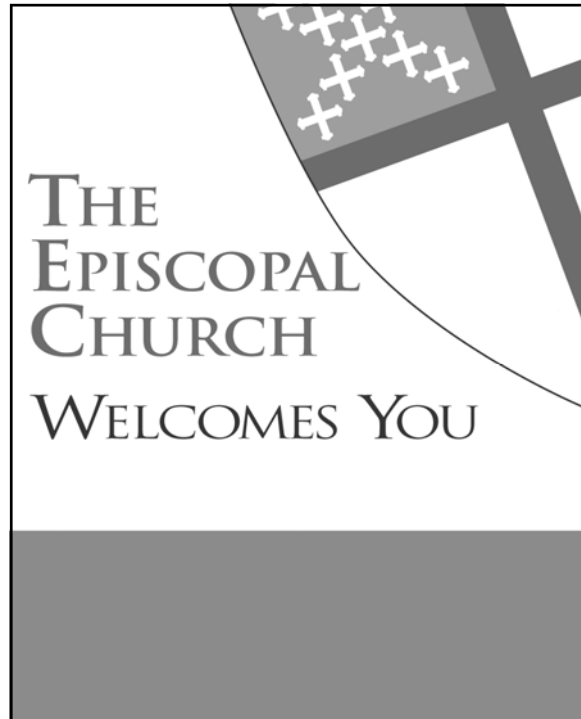
